Research into the experience of gay men in 2023

In May 2023, BBC Three launched the UK's first gay dating show, *I Kissed a Boy*. To accompany the broadcast, BBC Three commissioned Walnut Unlimited to carry out a survey of gay men, exploring their experiences of what it's like to live in the UK in 2023.

- Walnut interviewed an online sample of 501 UK adults aged 16+ who identify as gay men, between 5th and 12th May 2023.
- Age and geographical quotas were set to ensure a representative sample. At the analysis stage, data were weighted by age.
- All percentages are based on the full sample of 501 respondents, unless stated otherwise.
- We would like to thank all the men who shared their thoughts and experiences in the survey without them, this research would not have been possible!


The research has been conducted in accordance with ISO 20252 and ISO 27001, the international standards for market research and information security management.

Summary

Coming out	 Most gay men knew they were gay before their 16th birthday. Almost all have 'come out' to at least one person, usually starting with a friend or their mum. Having the coming out conversation was difficult for many, though most said the person they came out to was supportive and it was a relief to talk about it. However, in everyday life, more than a third of gay men hide their sexual orientation around strangers, and a quarter at work.
Relationships, dating and sex	 Most gay men feel comfortable sitting close to a partner or hugging in public. Yet, less than half feel comfortable holding hands or kissing in public, and around half have experienced discrimination over public displays of affection. A quarter were happily single at the time of the survey. The same proportion were looking for a relationship and just under half were in a relationship – mainly a monogamous one. Almost three quarters of gay men have used a dating app, looking for a relationship, sex, or friendship. Experiences of using these apps is mixed. Most gay men enjoy either penetrative or side sex, and are split fairly evenly for preferring top or bottom.
Discrimination	 More than half of gay men have experienced discrimination in public because they are gay; more than four in ten have experienced it online. Six in ten have experienced discrimination from other gay men, most commonly for the way they look, their sexual preferences or for 'being too camp'. However, most feel that the UK has become more accepting of gay men over the last decade, and that they experience less discrimination here than in other countries.
Spaces and representation	 For most gay men, it's important that there are spaces for gay people in their area. That said, just over half say there are not enough spaces for gay people locally. While more than half of gay men agree that people like them are represented in fictional TV shows, a quarter believe they are not represented enough in dating shows. Most reported having seen an openly gay man on TV during their teenage years, with Julian Clary, Paul O'Grady and John Inman among those most commonly mentioned as the first.

About the sample

In the research we interviewed n=501 gay men from across the UK. This sample size, while smaller than may be typical for a national survey, reflected the challenge of interviewing a representative sample of respondents from a relatively low-incidence social group¹. Quotas were set to ensure a representative sample, with small weights applied to the final data set on age. Weighted demographic figures are shown in the graphs below.



Most knew they were gay before their 16th birthday. Almost all have come out to at least one person, with their friend or mum usually the first to know



Q3. Have you told other people about your sexual orientation (often referred to as 'coming out')? (n=501)


Many gay men found it difficult to have their first conversation about their sexual orientation, and most report hiding their sexual orientation at some point as a teenager

Most gay men found that the people they first told were supportive, and that coming out was a relief. However, almost half said that other people were told without their permission





Experience of the first time telling people about your sexual orientation


Q7. Thinking about today, which of the following people have you told about your sexual orientation? Base: have told someone (n=467)

Relationships, dating and sex


Most gay men feel comfortable sitting close to a partner or hugging them in public, but only a minority feel comfortable dancing, holding hands or kissing in public




Feeling comfortable with public displays of affection

NET: experienced discrimination while doing any of the following




Have you experienced discrimination or prejudice for doing any of the following in public?

Q12. Which of these best describes your relationship status? (n=501)


Q13. Which of these best describes the relationship you are in? Base: in a relationship (n=222)

Gay men are most likely to consider a monogamous relationship or marriage, though a quarter would consider a civil partnership or an open relationship




Most gay men enjoy either penetrative or side sex, and are split fairly evenly for preferring top or bottom

Q18. Do you use any dating apps, or have you used them in the past? (n=501) Q19. Which of these reasons, if any, have you used dating apps for? (n=359)




Discrimination

Over half of gay men said that they have experienced discrimination in public because they are gay, and more than four in ten online


I have experienced discrimination or prejudice in **public** because I am gay




I have experienced discrimination or prejudice in **online** because I am gay




Four out of five gay men believe that the UK has becoming more accepting towards them over the past 10 years, and most agree that the UK is becoming a safer place to be a gay man






Three out of five gay men said they have experienced discrimination from other gay men, most commonly for the way their body looks, for their sexual preferences or 'being too camp'




Nearly four in five gay men have experienced some sort of stereotyping due to being a gay man





Spaces and representation


Over half of gay men agree that it is important that there are spaces for gay people, and almost two thirds that it is important to save spaces for gay people in their area



Experience with gay bars, gay clubs and other spaces for gay people



Over half of gay men agreed that people like them were represented on fictional TV shows, but a quarter thought they were not represented on dating shows




Do you agree or disagree that people like you are represented on TV shows?
